Downtown Lexington Management District Board of Directors Meeting Wednesday, September 6, 2017 9th Floor (Jim Frazier's Office)

**Present Board Members:** Jim Frazier, Taunya Phillips, Stephen Grossman, Zedtta Wellman, Kevin Atkins, Liza Betz, Andrew Carter, Scott Davidson, Jake Gibbs, Steve Kay, Gary Means, Nick Nicholson, Woodford Webb and Lawrence Wetherby.

**Advisory Board Members:** Beverly Fortune, Thomas Pettit, Salvador Sanchez, Donna Smith and Larry Jones.

Other Persons Present: Kate Savage (Arts Connect), Kathryn Minton (DLC), Brett Bibb (DLC), Rob Bright (DLC), David Warren (Block-by-Block), Lori Houlihan (Mayor's Office), Ethan Howard (LDDA), Joe Rey-Barreau (University of Kentucky Lighting) and Mary Quinn Ramer (VisitLEX).

Jim Frazier welcomed the board, and began the meeting. The minutes from the August 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting were approved with a motion from Zedtta Wellman and a second from Steve Grossman. The motion passed unanimously.

Steve Grossman delivered the treasurers report. The largest expense is still the contract with Block-by-Block and there are two, one time charges from Lamar Advertising for the DLMD billboards and the charge from buying the heated pressure washer. Other than those one-time charges, the report is as expected.

In old news David Warren addressed the Porous Pave project, and stated that Alex Fransen with the Fransen Group, who will be installing the Porous Pave, will be visiting later today to take a look at the tree wells that will be getting the Porous Pave. Jake Gibbs mentioned that he spoke with JD McHargue, owner of Henry Clay's Public House and the owner was wondering what a proposed date for the Porous Pave product to be installed. David responded by saying they will have a timeline after Mr. Fransen takes a look at the projected areas later in the day.

David also mentioned that he has spoken with the owner at 127 W. Main Street to offer solutions for the bird waste issue in front of their property. David explained that the owner has used bird spikes, bird noise deterrents and other preventative measures to no avail. David is going to continue working with the property owner.

Steve Kay raised a question about the panhandling numbers found in the board packet. The numbers are down from previous months, and David confirmed his observation by saying the ambassadors have not reported as much interaction on the streets. David feels this can be attributed to the City's Office of Homelessness Intervention and Prevention's recent campaign to encourage the public not to give money to panhandlers and the "End Panhandling Now" van.

In new business Beverly Fortune introduced Joe Rey-Barreau as a part of an ad-hoc committee to explore better lighting opportunities in the downtown area. The goals of the committee were to make downtown a more attractive, inviting, fun and safe place, along with bringing more events downtown focused on projection mapping and entertainment lighting. Beverly explained that the committee is looking for a place to house the lighting project, and that the committee is only in place to get the ball

rolling for improvements in downtown Lexington. The presentation highlighted many other cities, states and countries that have lighting installations and festivals centered on lighting used as art.

There were several questions and comments regarding the lighting project, starting with Woodford Webb. Woodford agreed that the lighting project was a great idea and inquired about the Old Historic Courthouse lighting. Woodford suggested looking into the new courthouse budget for exterior lighting that could be a great place to start with some of the ideas of the project.

Mary Quinn Ramer explained that the lighting project showcases safety, energy and excitement for visitors and provides more reasons to visit our city.

Several board members agreed, and mentioned other areas that could have a huge impact with a change in lighting, including Thoroughbred Park, Phoenix Park and Cheapside Park. Gary Means mentioned that the lighting installation on the side of Helix parking garage cost about \$250,000. The lighting display has a huge impact on that area and people inquire about changing the colors for holidays and other events.

Woodford believes the perfect place to house the project is the Downtown Lexington Partnership, and that maybe the project should be revisited once the new organization is consolidated. He is also concerned about city ordinances in regards to lighting public spaces. He mentioned that the board should use caution when selecting the spaces to light, because DLMD money should be used for public spaces, not private property improvements.

Beverly mentioned that when the Management District was just being started, that they pitched matching grants as a way to help property owners increase their property value. She also explained that light the outside of a building is public space.

Jake Gibbs mentioned that he supports the project as a way to increase the since of safety and security downtown after dark.

The board decided that the project will be revisited, and if Beverly wanted to get some numbers together for the Courthouse and Pavilion area the board would look at the project once again.

Conversation shifted to first floor vacant window spaces. Kathryn mentioned that postcards were sent to property owners and several peopled called to inquire about the space. Kathryn mentioned that DLC staff will follow up with the inquiries.

With the business complete, the board voted to adjourn.
